ur mission/ministry trip began this year with a Kid' Program at the Corella Creek Easter Convention in the Barkly area. After this we made a short detour back to Camooweal for fellowship with *Jono and Grace Wright*.

Bob and I then travelled south past Tennant Creek, east through the beautiful Davenport Ranges, and onto Canteen Creek to visit *Richard and Sue Davies*. During our visit we were able to run a Kid's Program, share in RE and attend the Bible studies. It was a very busy time but we thoroughly enjoyed it.

From there we were heading to Elliott which is 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours north of Tennant. We filled up with diesel in Tennant and 100 kms north our truck just stopped! This was Friday morning.

Bob worked out that the problem was water in the diesel — lots of it! It had blocked the injectors and fuel pump and we could go nowhere. So there we sat until a truckie towed us to a safer spot on the other side of the highway. We were in a complete dead zone — no mobile phone or internet coverage. We had to rely on people who stopped to take a message through to *Harold and Kaye Dalywaters* in Elliott.

Our girls were trying to find out what happened to us, as we had planned to contact them via Skype on Friday night. Sunday morning — what a *very* welcome sight! Harold and Kaye arrived in a borrowed vehicle and they ended up towing us to Elliott.

While we couldn't get out to any other communities, we were very grateful to be in Elliott and to later receive a Sat phone to give us coverage everywhere!

After a month, our vehicle was finally towed to Darwin. We expected it would take a month or so to repair, but no, it was gone for over 4 months! We wondered at times what God's purpose was, but we had to just stay close to Him knowing that He is always in control. Our Bible reading for the day when the truck went to Darwin was Romans 8:28!

God was very good to us in providing two borrowed vehicles during the time we were stranded. This allowed us to pick up folk for church and kids for Sunday school, get to the post office — things we can easily take for granted.

All in all our time in Elliott this year was very profitable with Sunday school each week as well as Bible study and Sunday night



Church. We were able to show a complete DVD series through the Gospels and Acts in Kriol and English in both Elliott and Marlinja.

We were still able to go down to Tennant for the Birthday Weekend and run the Kid's Program on Saturday and Sunday mornings. Each day we had approximately 50 children attending.

At long last the call came in 'the truck is fixed and ready to go'. On 2nd October Bob and a good friend picked it up. He said the 740 kms back to Elliott was a 'dream run' as the truck ran like a clock.

This ordeal has been such a long journey, and we are very thankful that it is over!

In the middle of all of that, I had a fall that meant we had a couple of trips to Katherine to visit the chiropractor. Nothing like an 800km round trip to see one! There was no resolution so I eventually flew to Brisbane to see my own physicians and was away over 6 weeks. The up side was I got to spend time with our daughter Linda who was home briefly from ministry in Taiwan, and also with our grandson and his parents.

There was no real resolution so I flew back to Darwin and Bob came up to meet me. The pain continued disabling me until I had another fall! This relieved the original pain, but I still have a very sore back and wonder when God will say 'enough'.

Our trip back home to Toowoomba will be slower than usual as I cannot sit for long periods of time. But God willing, we will be back in Elliott sometime next year.

The Corella Creek mob had an Easter Convention. We were able to go and we all really enjoyed the fellowship with them and also with

our brothers and sisters who came from Tennant Creek. There were nine people baptised over the weekend and some of them were from here. Some other people gave their hearts to the Lord.

One lady from Borroloola came back to the Lord at the Convention. A few of us visited her and the other locals who became Christians at the Convention. We spent time encouraging them and giving them some Bible teaching. She tells a story of how God has helped her along this narrow road. She loves reading her Bible even though she never went to school. She says our Lord has shown her how to read His Word.

Vincent Charlie and I went by bus into Katherine one week. Rhonda Coats met us and helped us try and get the signatures changed on our bank account. She took us out to meet Jocelyn and Anita at Barunga. After Rhonda introduced us she went visiting while we shared our stories and news of our churches with one another. The Lake Nash Church came to us in early May to do a play about the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus. They came with *Paul Johnson*, but it was their own idea to come. It was so good to have the Lake Nash Christians

Later on Paul Johnson brought another mob out here from a Church in Victoria. One girl was very convicted when she heard Vincent talk about how some people get baptised then turn away from following the Lord. When that group went somewhere else on their trip she got baptised!

The Caringbah Baptist group came out to us again this year. They seemed to have a happy time sharing with us in our meetings. They had a special meeting for kids one night.

Every Sunday night we go out and have an outreach service in one of the camps around Borroloola. This is a good way to get God's Word out to our people. One young girl said that after our service in her camp she had a real good rest that night. Before that she had been very troubled in her heart.

ospitable, resilient, courageous, adventurous, lover of music, teacher, mentor. These were some of the descriptions that flowed through the tributes at the memorial service for *Betty Long* who went to be with her Lord on October 1st. She was 93.

Betty grew up in the USA. Her love of music began early when she learned to play the piano at age 8. She enjoyed participating in a wide spectrum of music — from playing piano and brass instruments, singing in choirs and conducting music, to leading the Singleton Bible Institute Choir and eventually leading the large CWCI Choir in the Sydney Opera House. Whatever she was doing musically (and in many other spheres), her vibrancy and passion always came through.

She grew up attending church and Sunday school and came to a personal faith in Jesus Christ in her early teens. After graduating from High School her father pleaded with her to attend Moody Bible Institute for a year before going to the college of her choice. He actually wouldn't pay for anything else until she did!

While at Moody she met *Ed Long* and on 14 February 1942 they were married. It was to be a 72 year example of a beautiful Christ-centred marriage, always with the other's best interest at heart, and a true partnership in ministry. They always respected, encouraged and supported one another, especially in the use of their gifts and abilities which dovetailed and complemented one another beautifully.

In 1945 she left her home, family, and friends for far off Australia to join AIM with her husband and 3 month old daughter *Retta*. Throughout the years she showed great resilience as she transitioned into all the changes and new things with energy and commitment.

Their first assignment was to Cummeragunja. Their faith was tested when baby Retta became ill. It was a 100 km. trip to the hospital in a 40+ degree heat wave. The diagnosis of scarlet fever, whooping cough, and pneumonia must have been devastating — especially to Betty being so far from family and home. What could be done? The doctor's reply — 'Get this hot weather changed'. They prayed earnestly and suddenly a cool breeze began and the temperature started dropping — and so did Retta's!

Sometime after this the Longs went to Singleton Bible

Institute for seven years. Helen and John were born during this time. Betty lectured and mentored, was a secretary for Ed, and she provided much hospitality. Reflecting on Singleton days she said, 'The students made much progress spiritually as well as in many other ways. This was what we wanted most of all for them — a deeper experience of Christ.'

In 1953 Ed was appointed Director and remained so until 1972. Betty always worked alongside him, supporting, teaching, and encouraging not only others but Ed as well.

Meeting new people and hearing their story was something Betty loved. The family recalls how they 'daily had people in our home intersecting with the fabric of our lives'. Through her hospitality she created the space for everyone to open up and she lovingly kept them within her sphere of influence. She wanted people to know that God had not forgotten them and that He always cared for them.

Betty was able to hand a situation or concern over to the Lord and not worry about the outcome. She said 'this can free us to move forward in our lives with the knowledge that God is in control and we can trust that we

will be looked after. By doing this, we have victory over our circumstances as we wait patiently for a resolution.'
