found the word love a difficult one to describe during our early days in Camooweal. It can have so many different meanings and sometimes none of them are all that clear. Couple this with the fact that many desert Indigenous languages don't have abstract nouns and you are faced with further complications. It means the word love is often used for things that are inaccurate, unhelpful and confuses the true meaning even more.

What comes to your mind when you think about the meaning of the word love? Sadly lots of people think of love simply as a feeling, but feelings come and go all the time! How many marriages do you know of where people say they have lost that feeling? But true love, God's love, is different. God's love is everlasting, it is steadfast (unwavering, immovable, fixed in place), something we can depend on even when everything else in life falls apart.

The writer of Psalm 33 starts off on a high note pointing to the need to praise God and honour Him in a variety of ways and closing off the section with the words

"The earth is full of the steadfast love of the LORD".

This love of God is steadfast and it fills the earth. The psalmist goes on to talk about God's wonderful acts of creating everything and His sovereign power over all creation and even the actions of man.

All the governments of the world, all the plans of the people, all the actions of man are all in the hands of God. Some people find it difficult to accept that God is in control of all that, but the psalmist is clear, he lays it out straight for us.

What a comfort it is to know that God is in control and that whatever we see happening around us we can know that our Father has got that situation in His hands. Because 'the eye of the Lord is on those who fear Him, on those who hope in his steadfast love'.

God has set His love on us in a special way. We are His people and need to remember that. He has a special focus on those who trust in Him. His love is a commitment to us. God is intentionally watching us. He is watching and is ready to act. His love for us never fails.

No matter where we find ourselves, God's eye is on those who fear Him and hope in His steadfast love. This is true even for those who have just lost everything in the horrific summer bushfires or the floods, whether your country is plagued with drought or crushed by the abuses of men. God's eye is on you and you can trust in Him.

"That He may deliver their soul from death and keep them alive in famine".


Of course this verse is ultimately fulfilled in what God has done for us in sending Jesus His only Son to die on the cross for our sins, and to rise again three days later all for the salvation of our souls. It is only through Jesus that we can truly be saved from death.

I began to realise afresh in Camooweal that God's love is His actions towards us, His people.

He shows us His love by the way He treats us and the things He does in our lives to make us more like Jesus. He keeps His eye on us because He loves us.

God's love is much, much more than a feeling, it is the way He treats us and it is wonderful. Can you say with the writer 'Our souls waits for the Lord, he is our help and our shield. For our heart is glad in Him, because we trust in His holy name. Let your steadfast love, O Lord, be upon us, even as we hope in you.'?

What an awesome God we have!



Road to Dialysis

he road to dialysis is one that leads us away from our home, our country, family, friends, and church. It can be a very sad and lonely road. RENALUNIA

Some of us get on this road because of our choices. That's my story anyway. I remember the nurses and doctors telling me over many years about what I should eat and not eat and drink, telling me I should get more exercise and look after myself when I got diabetes. I didn't listen to them. They tried to tell us about not having scabies and not letting sores get infected. I heard these stories and read the papers, but I didn't take notice. I just kept going my own way and doing what I wanted to do, eating and drinking what I wanted. I didn't really look after myself properly like they tried to help me to do.

And now, I've had to take that road to dialysis. It has taken me away from my family, church and country of Borroloola and I now live in Darwin. It was very sad not to be with my family at Christmas time, and to know I will miss out on a lot of things. I think about when the bush tucker will be ready and I can't go out hunting for it or enjoy fresh fish, turtle or kangaroo when family bring it back from hunting. I can go home sometimes, but it is hard to fit in a visit and not miss my treatments which I have to have 3 times a week. Borroloola is over 900 kms from Darwin mind you.

But as a Christian, I am trying to look on the bright side. I do have some family and friends here in Darwin. It is good to have fellowship with my Christian friends. Some people from home are on dialysis like me, so I try to encourage them and the other patients.

Lots of people are sent into Darwin hospital from Borroloola for medical reasons. It is good now because I can go visit them myself and talk to them about Lord Jesus, pray for them, and give them Christian things to read. I used to always ring Rhonda (Coats) and Simon (McKee) or Alan (Rogers with SIL) to do that but I can serve my Lord by doing this myself now. That part is really good.

If there were renal nurses willing and available, I and many others could return home and do dialysis there. They would be a great job for Christians to do! They could also give us Christians encouragement as we lead our churches and do God's work in and around our communities too.

Please pray for all us dialysis patients who have had to leave home and now live in places like Darwin, Katherine, Tennant Creek or Alice Springs in the Territory. Pray that we will keep going strong for Lord Jesus and find ways to work for Him where we are. Pray that I can talk a really good way to family and friends to take notice to look after themselves properly. I don't want them to end up on the road to dialysis too.




Looking for Disciples

he hair of so many is now grey, and some have significant health problems. But the Christian leaders across our field carry on in sharing the Word, teaching Sunday school, driving the church bus, going on outreach, etc. because they love the Lord ... but also because there is a great lack of young ones or new believers stepping up to share in God's work.

Praying for new people to become followers of Jesus is always important, and always a part of our focus. But we also need to focus on praying they will grow as disciples and in faithfulness – in their living and in taking an active part in the church.

Several leaders have said that they know they are getting

old and they want young ones to do more in the church and to become leaders. They want to help grow them up into that.

Pray that centres will have new people coming to Jesus. Pray too for a willingness among them to be faithful in their walk and in doing more for Jesus. Pray they will be willing and eager to work alongside and learn from those who have serving Jesus for many years now.

Please pray that the health and strength of our current church leaders will be sustained as they continue to serve Jesus. And pray that the younger ones will look after themselves so that they will have strength and good health to be trained up in serving Jesus... and then in time be able to train up the others who will follow them. years in service with AIM before


joining other denominations for ministry. They spent many years in Gilgandra including his latter years before needing to go into care. The sympathy of the Aim family is extended to Kathy and the family.

Dictionary

It was 25 years ago that the first Alyawarr to English Dictionary was compiled. On 8th November 2019 the release of a new, updated and substantially revised second edition was celebrated at Arlparra (Murray Downs). AIM worker *Peter Dixon* was able to make the 760 km round trip out from Tennant Creek for the special occasion. There are some Alyawarr speakers in TC and the church. It is also a language used in the Camooweal and Canteen Creek areas.

The dictionary has been compiled by Jennifer Green, David Moore, and David Blackman along with over 100 Alyawarr contributors. It includes explanations of Alyawarr grammar and pronunciation, a guide for using the dictionary, and tables of pronouns and word endings. There is also a discussion of Alyawarr kinship, updated index of scientific terms for plants and animals, and extensive English to Alyawarr finder list.

It is hoped that it will be used as a resource to help keep the language strong and help Alyawarr speakers who want to become literate in their language, by learners of the language, and by educators and interpreters.
