God Looked After Him

n the care of his son and on his home country, *Sunny Curtis* went to be with our Lord 31 October.

A very gentle man, he was by any standard a real gentleman. Sunny had been wonderfully changed by God's grace when he came to faith in Jesus in the late 1960's. This was under the ministry of *Charlie Main* and indigenous missionary *Nero Timothy* (from Borroloola). As he had not attended school before moving into Tennant for work, he attended night classes after his conversion and sought help from his family so he could learn to read God's Word.

Sunny always saw God at work and looking after him in his life and circumstances. One example was when he had to give up his good job at The Battery where they crush gold. Cyanide was being used and was making him very sick. Sunny was worried about how he would care for his family but when his boss got him a job with the town council he knew God was looking after him.

This new job gave him more time to work with the then missionaries *Elizabeth Ham and Jenny Benson*. Sunny was always there to take part in meetings at town camps and would willingly use his vehicle on the long rough roads out to places like Rockhampton Downs station and Epenarra to share God's message. He commented,

'It was so wonderful to work for the Lord and see our people turning to follow God's way.'

After much prayer, he and his wife *Gladys* (dec) and five children packed their belongings onto the back of their vehicle and headed to Elliott as missionaries. He was so happy and looking forward to doing God's work. But it was the rainy season and a new bridge was being built with water banked up on one side of the detour. They watched one car go through but when they tried they nearly got drowned — and ALL of their belongings were washed away. But through

it all, he again saw God looking after them as the car later started up again and allowed them to continue their journey. As they saw their needs provided in Elliott, Sunny testified 'Through all that time. God kept showing us that He is so real. He is so true. Our God is so wonderful. We only need to trust and leave everything in His hands.'

There were many strong ceremony men there who tried hard to trick Sunny and told people not to listen to him. They said they would do something



to him. When a big storm knocked down a special tree Sunny had to cut it down before it damaged the church building. He had been getting sick before this time, and his health was deteriorating.

A local friend Bonnie saw how sick he was and got him to medical help. He was flown to Adelaide and underwent heart surgery. The people of Elliott expected he would die through this and said it was because he had cut that tree down. Sunny often laughed as he told of returning to Elliott after his surgery and how the people thought he was a ghost! His words to them were, 'I come back to tell you that God is powerful and He loves you.' Not long after he returned, many of those who held strongly to the old ways passed away.

Sunny returned to Tennant Creek and again was involved in ministry there. Later he obtained land on his own country south of Tennant where he lived out his final years. He often faced health issues, trials, testing, family tragedy and grief, but as *Richard Davies* shared, 'He was such a great example of persevering through great trials...he finished well.'

One Lie...

ne lie — that was all it took. And now what had been deeply feared has become a reality — community transmission of Covid19 in the Northern Territory. All the efforts of Government, frontline health and emergency workers and the majority of the general public to keep it out came undone with one lie on an entry form. One person, one lie and Covid began spreading and shutting down businesses and putting some of our most vulnerable at risk.


As this goes to print, the epicentre of the outbreak has been Katherine and Robinson River — 2 hours east of Borroloola. One lady, unknowingly infectious after being exposed to the virus in Katherine travelled back to that small community then tested positive. New cases have emerged in Blnjari Community just outside of Katherine.

There have also been fears that contacts travelled from Katherine to Tennant Creek and the community of Yuendumu — and hundreds of people went through Katherine and into the Darwin area. The compromised health of so many indigenous people especially vulnerable. Some have only just lined up for the vaccine since the outbreak so it might have limited effect on

those with serious underlying health issues at this time.

Please pray that Christians will be strong in their faith and will be good witnesses when and however possible. Pray for strength, accuracy, and safety among all who are helping with the pandemic.

Pray that the situation will cause many indigenous people across the land to address their need of spiritual healing.





Expressed in Art

or centuries Christians around the world have expressed their faith and truth of scripture through various forms of art. Many indigenous people are among them. Recently, Miriam Charlie from Borroloola (now in Darwin for dialysis) was able to attend an Art in Faith

course at Nungalinga College in Darwin. She had often attended Bible courses at the AIM Darwin Bible College when it was functioning. Though she had worked with Barkly Arts for many years, it was always in an administrative role, never as an artist.

She found the course challenging but very good in helping her to put truth from God's Word onto canvas. She was especially focussed on expressing the teaching from Psalm 1: 3 'They are strong like a tree planted by a river'. Pray that she will continue to be strengthened by **God's Word and will enjoy expressing** truth through her life, art, and words.

Harold Dalywater was also at the college at that time doing the introductory course. His wife Kaye and children in their care were able to join him part way through his block of studies. Pray that he will continue to learn and grow at home and be a faithful witness to others in Elliott.



















"Encouraging Each Other With These Words" Birthday Weekend # 37



One area of concern is the high cost of printing and posting this quarterly magazine. We certainly appreciate those who keep up their yearly gift towards receiving it. Thank you so much.



Many family members of Betty live at Corella and the grandchildren spend a lot of time with her and Cedric. Each morning before school Cedric gathers the children where their outdoor services are held and teaches them from the Bible. The teacher became curious and wandered over one morning to see what was going on. He now joins them and even bought Cedric a new bible to replace the very well worn one he was using.

Sadly, a growing number of people from Borroloola are being moved to Darwin for dialysis. While it is good to connect with them, it is sad to know they have such health problems and have to be away from home.
